BNP-M President Sardar Akhtar Mengal had announced a "long march" from Wadh to Quetta to protest the arrests of BYC chief organiser Dr Mahrang Baloch and other leaders as well as police crackdowns on a sit-in. However, the Quetta administration had denied the party permission for Mengal reiterated his de-

Decision to expel refugees has 'shaken' Afghan community in Pakistan: UNHCR

Islamabad(News Desk) The head of the UN's refugee agency in Pakistan on Sunday expressed concern as the departure deadline for Afghan Citizenship Card (ACC) holders draws closer, warning that the decision has "shaken" the Afghan community.

As part of the government's plan to repatriate all illegal foreigners, March 31 was officially set as the deadline for ACC holders to leave Pakistan voluntarily, with a renewed warning by the interior ministry that mass deportations would commence afterwards.

In an Eidul Fitr message, United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) representative for Pakistan Philippa Candler expressed her concerns as Pakistani officials have ruled out any change in the deadline.

Night travel banned on key highways in Balochistan

Gawadar(News Desk) The Balochistan government has banned night-time travel — mostly for public transport - on major highways in several districts amid a deteriorating security situation, it emerged on Sunday.

The move comes amid a rise in terrorist attacks across Balochistan, including multiple incidents this year where passengers were targeted and gunned down. The deputy commission-

ers of Gwadar, Kachhi, Zhob, Noshki and Musakhel districts issued no-

dered that public transport departing from the city be barred from plying the roads at night.Quetta Commissioner Hamza Shafqaat told Dawn.com that he chaired a meeting, where "it was decided that public transport would be prohibited from travelling on the Karachi-Quetta highway (N-25), also known as the RCD High-

way, at night, discon-necting Balochistan from Sindh." It was also stressed to ensure that buses and coaches depart in a timely man-

"Trackers and CCTV cameras in all buses and coaches would be kept functional, while transporters have been told to cooperate with the government directives,"

Shafqaat said. In a notification issued on March 28, Gwadar DC Hamoodur Rehman said all public transport on the Makran Coastal Highway (N-10) would be banned at night till further orders. It further said that keeping the "passengers' security" in mind, the administration and the private transport association had




Utility Stores Corporation to introduce new utility ghee brand

Lahore(News Desk) The Utility Stores Corporation (USC) is going to introduce its new utility ghee brand for citizens on cheaper rates as compared to local market for which tendering process has been completed. Talking to APP on Sunday, USC Zonal Manager Shahzad Khan said that applications had been sought from ghee mills and firms as tenders opened on April 4 at the USC head office for the procurement of 65,000 metric tonnes of vanaspati and 32,500 metric tonnes of cooking oil.

The ghee and cooking oil would be provided to various zones across the country as per demand," he added. He hoped the new ghee brand would be available at stores after Eidul Fitr, adding that the restructuring of 150 stores was being carried out across the zone. He said that sugar was being sold at stores at a price Rs15 per kilogramme less against the open market while dates, beverages, special gram flour, rice, ghee, and other items were also available."Efforts are being made to reduce the expenses and increase the sales," he said.

The operation "successfully neutralised" several high-value targets allegedly involved in militant activities in the region, as per the official version."Unfortunately, subsequent reports confirmed the presence of non-combatants, includ-

ing women and children, at the periphery of the target zone, resulting in tragic civilian casualties," added the press note.The government blamed complex terrain and militants' tactics to embed within civilian populations for the collateral damage.While calling the deaths "painful and regrettable", the provincial government extended condolences to the affected families.

KARACHI: (News Desk) The Sindh government has

come to the rescue of thousands of commercial establishments operating illegally in residential neighbourhoods across the city by amending the existing building regulations to allow them to continue using houses for financial gains.

However, while the controversial move may save some existing businesses, it could also wreak havoc on the already deteriorated city infrastructure as every residential area would soon be flooded with commercial activities including shops, schools and clinics.

The use of residential plots for commercial and recreational purposes has been allowed by the Sindh Building Control Authority (SBCA) that has amended the Karachi Building and Town Planning Regulations (KBTPR) 2002.

Three killed to avenge murder of YouTuber dacoit in Sadiqabad

RAHIM YAR KHAN: (News Desk) Three people were shot at and killed by dacoits in the Jamaldin Wali area of tehsil Sadiqabad near the Indus River, about 60 km from here, on Saturday noon.

Reports said Umar Lund and his two nephews were passing through the main bazaar of Shahpur when they were ambushed near Dodhay Wali Pulli. The attackers, alleged accomplices of deceased YouTuber dacoit Shahid Lund, opened fire, killing them on the spot. According to local residents, Umar Lund had killed Shahid Lund in early November 2024 during a Lund clan gathering, and this attack was a revenge killing carried out by Shahid's accomplices. The incident has left residents in shock, as dacoits once again brazenly took the law into their own hands in a populated rural area near Jamaldin Wali.Meanwhile, in a video message two accomplices of deceased Shahid Lund claimed responsibility for killing Umar Lund. Holding a G3 rifle of Umar Lund, the dacoits were seen in Katcha area and they said that they avenged the murder of Shahid Lund Jamaldin Wali is the hometown of PPP south Punjab President Makhdoom Ahmed Mehmood, and PPP MPA Mumtaz Chang has repeatedly raised concerns in the Punjab Assembly over the worsening law and order situation in the district.Last week, police killed several dacoits near Katcha Machka who were involved in the killings of policemen. According to a police spokesperson, the victims were identified as Umar Lund, Huzaifa Lund, and Khalid Dhanwani. Rahim Yar Khan District Police Officer (DPO) Rizwan Umar Gondal took notice of the incident and deployed a heavy police contingent to the area.

Pakistan fires back at Indian FM barbs over minority rights

ISLAMABAD: (News Desk) The Foreign Office on Saturday called on India to focus on improving the treatment of its own minorities rather than expressing concern over minority rights in Pakistan. "India is in no position to champion minority rights, as it remains a serial violator of those very rights," said the FO in a statement issued in response to remarks made by India's Minister for External Affairs S. Jaishankar in the Lok Sabha regarding the

The FO pointed to several instances of religious and ethnic persecution in India, highlighting what it called "egregious and systemic violations of minority rights".

Pakistan cited India's discriminatory Citizenship Amendment Act, the bulldozing of homes of minority communities, and large-scale violence against Muslims, including the 2002 Gujarat massacre and the 2020 Delhi



pogrom. Also, the FO referenced the demolition of Babri Mosque in 1992 and the 'consecration of a temple' on its ruins in 2024 as emblematic of state-sup

ported religious discrimination. The statement also condemned cow vigilantism, mob lynchings, and attacks on mosques and other religious sites.
