
Tobacco Smoke Contains Chemicals Causes Cancer: Cardiologist

HYDERABAD (News Desk): Smoking harms nearly every organ of the body and poses a serious threat to overall health, significantly increasing the risk of various lifethreatening diseases. Eminent cardiologist Dr. Zaman highlighted that tobacco smoke contains over fifty cancer-causing chemicals, alongside nicotine—a highly addictive



psychoactive drug that creates both physical and psychological dependence. He revealed that one in every three Pakistanis above the age of 40 suffers from high blood pressure, but only 3% seek regular medical checkups. Dr. Zaman warned that smoking not only endangers smokers but also severely affects those exposed to secondhand smoke, potentially causing serious complications. He emphasized that smoking remains the leading entirely preventable cause of death and disability, and any support for its production or sale is indefensible on public health grounds. Smoking is also linked to a 10% increased risk of oral cancers, including tongue and mouth cancer, and up to 15% increased risk of cardiac issues, tuberculosis, asthma, and respiratory diseases. He cautioned that alternatives such as gutka, betel nut, and other smokeless tobacco forms are even more harmful than cigarettes. Noting a rise in smoking among students, Dr. Zaman called for a total ban on tobacco advertising in Pakistan, stressing that such smoking promotion normalizes and undermines He health education. recommended the use of nicotine gum and psychiatric help for those trying to quit, adding that strong willpower and support from family and friends are essential for success. He urged for community-based awareness campaigns to educate the public about the dangers of smoking and to promote healthier lifestyles.

University Of Kamalia Leads In Communitysupported Scholarship

Initiative FAISALABAD (News Desk): The University of Kamalia has taken a pioneering step by launching community-supported scholarship initiative support underprivileged students in accessing higher education. Vice Chancellor Prof. Dr. Yasir Nawab highlighted that thousands of talented students across Pakistan's public universities struggle to pay initial semester fees, often resorting to loans or selling family assets like jewelry. While various scholarships become available post-admission—such as the Chief Minister's Honhar Merit Scholarship, HEC Need-Based Scholarships, and University Merit Awards—many deserving students are unable to even begin their academic journey due to financial constraints. Addressing this challenge, the University of Kamalia, in collaboration with the local community, has introduced an innovative program ensuring that no student admitted on merit is denied education due to lack of funds. Under this scheme, students unable to afford admission fees are fully sponsored from day one. Currently, nearly 200 high-achieving students—about 20% of the new intake—have been admitted under this model, with full financial support for their entire four-year degree program or until alternate scholarships are secured.

DWTC Hospitality Serves Over Half Million Guests Across 1,401 Events In H1 2025



DUBAI (News Desk): Dubai World Trade Centre (DWTC) announced strong H1 2025 results for its Hospitality division, serving over 527,000 guests across 1,401 events—an 11.8 percent year-on-year increase in guests and a 6.7 percent rise in events catered. Dozens Killed, Injured In Israeli Airstrikes Across Gaza



GAZA (News Desk): Several Palestinians were martyred and others injured early Tuesday as Israeli warplanes bombed multiple areas across the Gaza Strip. According to Palestinian medical sources, two people were killed and others injured in an Israeli strike targeting a residential apartment in western Gaza. Eight Palestinians were martyred and 11 others wounded in an airstrike on a house in the north of the Nuseirat refugee camp in central Gaza. In a separate attack, four citizens were killed and more injured when Israeli forces bombed a tent sheltering displaced persons in the Mina area of Mawasi, Khan Yunis. Israeli occupation forces also continued shelling eastern areas of Gaza City, particularly the Tuffah neighbourhood, causing further destruction and widespread panic. On Monday, 30 Palestinians were killed in Nuseirat refugee camp following strikes on several residential houses. Since the beginning of Israel's aggression on 7th October 2023, at least 59,921 Palestinians—mostly children and women—have been killed and 145,233 injured, according to the latest figures. The actual death toll is believed to be higher, as many victims remain trapped under rubble or in areas unreachable by emergency responders.

Mobile Phone Imports Decreases 21.31% To \$1.494 Bn In FY 2025

ISLAMABAD (News Desk): The import of mobile phones into Pakistan witnessed a decrease of 21.31 percent during the fiscal year 2024-25 compared to the previous year, with imports totaling US \$1.494 billion during July—June 2024-25, down from US \$1.898 billion in the same period of 2023-24, according to the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS). On a year-to-year basis, mobile phone imports dipped sharply by 49.95 percent in June 2025 compared to June 2024, falling to \$139.425 million from \$278.574 million. However, on a month-to-month basis, June 2025 saw a 39.60 percent increase from May 2025, when imports stood at \$99.875 million. Meanwhile, the country's overall exports increased by 4.67 percent in FY 2024-25, reaching \$32.106 billion compared to \$30.675 billion the previous year. Imports also rose by 6.57 percent, from \$54.779 billion in 2023-24 to \$58.380 billion in 2024-25.


