New UN Report Warns Of Climate Change Risks To Older Persons, Ecosystems

UNITED NATIONS (News Desk) In a world increasingly shaped by climate extremes, environmental experts have issued a stark warning through the UN Environment Programme's (UNEP) Frontiers Report 2025, highlighting four rapidly emerging threats that could significantly reshape life for millions if urgent action is not taken. These include the reawakening of ancient microbes from melting glaciers, toxic legacy pollutants released by floods, the need to remove dams to restore river ecosystems, and the rising climate vulnerability of a growing ageing population. UNEP Executive Director Inger Andersen emphasized that these threats are no longer theoretical-they are already here and escalating, demanding immediate global response to protect people, nature, and economies. As glaciers melt at record speeds, they risk unleashing dormant bacteria, fungi, and viruses long frozen in ice and permafrost, with potentially unknown health consequences. In the Colombian Amazon and other parts of South America, shrinking river levels due to drought and dam activity are cutting off water supplies, shuttering schools, and increasing risks of disease and child exploitation. The elderly are also increasingly at risk, as the global population over 65 is expected to grow from 10% in 2024 to 16% by 2050, with most living in urban centers vulnerable to extreme heat and pollution. Meanwhile, extreme flooding is unearthing long-buried pollutants such as heavy metals and toxic chemicals, as seen in Pakistan's 2010 floods, the 2012 Niger Delta disaster, and 2017's Hurricane Harvey. Experts call for a combination of mitigation and adaptation strategies, including preserving cryospheric microorganisms, removing ecological barriers like dams, rethinking flood protection through nature-based solutions, and developing specific climate resilience plans for vulnerable populations, especially the elderly.

Shipping Activity At Port Qasim

KARACHI, (News Desk) Two ships, Dalma and Al-Jassasiya carrying Palm oil and LNG, berthed at Liquid Cargo Terminal and Port Gas Power Terminal respectively on Sunday. Meanwhile two more ships, Evridiki and Martin Le Havre scheduled to laod/offload Furnace oil and Gas oil also arrive at outer anchorage on same day. Ten ships were engaged at PQA berths during the last 24 hours, out of them four ships, MSC Justice-III, Nave Anderomeda, Maya Gas-1 and Fuwairit left the port on Monday. Cargo volume of 213,880 tonnes, comprising 205,619 tonnes imports cargo and 8,261 export cargo carried in 1,642 Containers (1,642 TEUs Imports & 0 TEUs Export) was handled at the port during last 24 hours. Ten ships at Outer Anchorage of Port Qasim, out of them two ships, Torm Malaysia and Desert Dignity & four more ships, Xin Lian Chang, Eleni-T, MSC Mediterrnean and MSC Rochelle carrying Mogas, Coal and Container are expected to take berths at FOTCO, PIBT and QICT respectively on Monday, while another containers ship 'GFS Prime' due to arrive at outer anchorage on Tuesday.

Actor Ruchi Gujar Accuses Film Producer Karan Singh Of INR2.3m Fraud

MUMBAI, (News Desk) A major controversy on Saturday erupted in the entertainment industry as actor and model Ruchi Gujar filed a formal complaint against film producer Karan Singh and accused him of delirauding her of ₹2.3 million (INR 23 lakh). The Mumbai police said that the dispute took a dramatic turn during the



premiere of Singh's latest film "So Long Valley" on Friday night, when Ruchi Gujar confronted him on stage and struck him with a slipper in front of a live audience. Videos of the altercation quickly went viral on social media platforms. Officials confirmed that a First Information Report (FIR) was filed by Gujar at Oshiwara Police Station, invoking multiple sections of the Indian Penal Code related to cheating and breach of trust. In her complaint, Gujar alleged that producer Singh had promised her a role in a TV film project, a share in profits, and on-screen credit in return for an investment of ₹2.3 million, but later failed to fulfill any of the commitments. As a result, she pursued legal action. The police have launched an investigation and are communications and financial transactions between the two parties. Authorities have assured that the matter will be dealt with as per legal protocols. The case has also discussions around transparency, and accountability in the Indian film industry.

US-Pakistan Partnership In Higher Education Takes A Major Leap Forward With Launch Of NIT
