OTTAWA (News Desk): Canadian social media content creator Anita Wing Lee has tied the knot with her 4-foot-tall friend Timothy Moto, and their unique and heartfelt love story has gone viral online. The couple first met in 2021 through mutual friends. Initially, Anita felt no romantic interest, and despite Tim — an engineer and co-founder of a clean water nonprofit expressing his feelings, she had "friendzoned" him. Though she initially rejected his proposal and even drafted a "just friends" message with her sister's help, she soon regretted it, realizing she didn't want to lose someone who truly understood her heart. The couple got engaged in September 2024 and married this year. Their sincere and inspiring journey has touched thousands, and they now regularly share their love story online. Mumbai (News Desk): A major controversy Bollywood Raanjhanaa, originally released 12 years ago, was re-released on August 1 in Tamil with its ending altered through artificial intelligence (AI). The film's original tragic conclusion, where the protagonist Kundan dies, was changed to a happy ending in which he survives. This change has sparked backlash, including strong criticism from the film's lead actor Dhanush and director Aanand L. Rai. Raanjhanaa, released in 2013, marked Tamil actor Dhanush's debut in Hindi cinema. Directed by Aanand L. Rai and produced by Eros International, the film starred Dhanush as Kundan, a Hindu boy who falls in love with a Muslim girl named Zoya, played by Sonam Kapoor. The story follows Kundan's unrequited love, as Zoya moves to another city for studies and falls for another man, Akram, played by Abhay Deol. In the original version, Kundan dies at the end, sacrificing Zoya's happiness. International, which owns the full and exclusive rights to the film, re-released it with an AI-generated alternate ending that shows Kundan surviving, thus giving the story a happier resolution. However, Dhanush took to social media to express his dismay, saying that this AI-generated change disturbed him deeply. "This alternate ending has taken away the soul of the film. This is not the same film I was part of 12 years ago," he wrote. Dhanush also raised concerns about the use of AI to modify films, calling it a dangerous precedent for art and artists, and urged for strict regulations to prevent such practices. Director Aanand L. Rai also criticized the move, calling it an irresponsible and horrifying experiment. He told international film magazine Screen that he was unaware of the change until people started asking him about it on social media.

Legendary Singer Akhlaq Ahmed Remembered on His 26th Death Anniversary

LAHORE (News Desk): Renowned Pakistani playback singer Akhlaq Ahmed is remembered on his 26th death anniversary. Known for his mesmerizing voice, he continues to live in the hearts of his fans. Born on January 10, 1946, in Delhi, Akhlaq Ahmed began his career in 1960 as a stage singer. His breakthrough came in 1974 with a hit song from the film Chahat. The song from the film Bandish catapulted him to fame. Over the course of his career, he sang 177



songs for 86 films as a playback singer and received the prestigious Nigar Award seven times. His last recorded song was for the film Nikkah. Even today, his songs remain widely popular among listeners. Akhlaq Ahmed passed away on August 4, 1999, after battling cancer.

Germany's Oldest LGBTQ+ Club 'SchwuZ' Faces Bankruptcy Amid Cultural and Economic Shifts

Berlin (News Desk): Germany's oldest and largest LGBTQ+ dance club, SchwuZ, which has been illuminating Berlin's nightlife for nearly 50 years, is now on the brink of bankruptcy. The club recently announced that it has filed for insolvency due to severe financial difficulties. SchwuZ has long been more than just an entertainment venue—it served as a second home for Berlin's LGBTQ+ community, offering a safe space for identity, freedom, and self-expression. The club played a pivotal role in the 1979 Christopher Street Day Parade and was instrumental in launching the renowned LGBTQ+ magazine Siegessäule. Multiple factors have contributed to SchwuZ's financial decline: rising inflation, increased electricity and rental costs, the growing popularity of dating apps keeping people at home, shifts in party culture, outdated music styles, and high ticket prices—all of which have alienated patrons. In recent months, the club faced monthly losses ranging from €30,000 to €60,000. In an effort to survive, SchwuZ reduced operating hours, laid off staff, appealed for public support.
